The Scranton Student Council will tie red ribbons on our trees; put a Red Ribbon message on our fence; and sponsor a classroom door decorating contest. SAC will also celebrate Red Ribbon Week with a theme for each day of the week, October 26 – October 29. The themes will be as follows:

Monday, October 26 – “Wear Red Day”

Students and staff are asked to wear red clothing to celebrate today's theme.

Wednesday, October 28 – “Follow Your Dreams”

Scranton Attendance Center Veterans' Day Activities

1. Invite veterans to our school assembly on Nov. 11, 2009, at 10:30 a.m.
 - Students in each classroom can write letters or make and send invitations to veterans in their family or in our communities.
 - Student Council members will meet and greet veterans attending the assembly
 - Veterans will be asked to stay and eat lunch following the assembly.
2. A world map will be placed in a hallway, and students may bring pictures of grandparents or family members who are veterans and not able to attend our assembly, or who are deceased. Students bringing pictures need to write a short paragraph about the person they are honoring, stating where in the world this person served his/her country. For each veteran, we will mark the map where they have served.
3. Everyone attending the assembly will say the “Pledge of Allegiance” and sing the “Star Spangled Banner” together.
4. Each veteran attending the assembly will be asked to share who they are, where they served, and to what student or staff member they are connected.
5. Students will close the assembly by singing “America the Beautiful” and we will invite a SFT band student to end our assembly by playing taps.
