# **Individual Plans of Study**

As students navigate through high school and transition to career and college it is important to remember that not all students have the same plans. An **Individual Plan of Study** (IPS) is both a product and a process that students may use with support from families, teachers, and school counselors to help them define their career goals and postsecondary plans and make informed decisions about their courses and activities throughout high school.

Students at SFT are working during activity period every other Monday on various phases of their IPS. These phases include: self-exploration, career exploration, and career planning.

- Self-exploration activities develop a student's ability to identify skills, work values, and career interests.
- Career exploration activities develop a student's ability to connect their interests, skills, and values to a range of career options, identify the school courses and employability skills needed to enter careers of interest, and identify corresponding post-secondary pathways.
- Career planning activities are designed to help students in relation to acquiring job search skills needed to secure employment: developing career readiness skills; and developing the traits, work habits and behaviors needed to navigate career changes and pursue growth opportunities throughout a lifetime.

Students' post-secondary goals will be the forefront of the spring enrollment conferences for students in 9<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> grades. Talking with your students about their career interests and goals is an important way to contribute to their personal, career, and academic development.

## Digital Design & Production (Yearbook)

On September 26th, students attended the Kansas Scholastic Publication Association Fall Conference at KU. Students went to various workshops to help elevate their knowledge of publications as well help with the production of the yearbook as well. The students that attended really enjoyed the conference and left with many ideas and new information.

Then on October 15th, the students went to various businesses in Carbondale, Overbrook, Scranton, as well Topeka to secure business ads to help fund the Yearbook. Then we met with a cover artist at the Topeka Jostens Plant to design the cover for the 2020 Yearbook. Students worked hard coming up with the theme as well the different design elements. In class we are working hard to master all of the elements that are included with Yearbook - photography, interviewing, writing, and basic soft skills.

## Graphic Design

Students in Graphic Design have been learning about the Design Elements and practicing them creating their own versions of the Musical graphics. # Career & Life Planning

In Career & Life Planning we have added to the Classroom Economy where students get hands-on practical learning of doing the many things we are learning. As we learned about Banking and Checking Accounts, students were able to apply to open an account at the Charger Bank. Two of the students in class, their job is to be bank tellers. We are using a free online program called My Kids Bank. The tellers are able to deposit and withdraw money out of the student's individual accounts. Plus, students are able to log-on online to see their account balance. We are also using educational checkbooks donated by Kansas State Bank to practice writing checks in class for the various expenses we have in the classroom economy (Rent, Utilities, being tardy, hallway toll fee, etc.) Students even had to reconcile their bank statement at the end of the month to make sure their checkbook register matches the bank statement. On day students experience a "Life Happens" day where they got a different scenario and money amount. Then they had to write a check to pay for that scenario.

# Game Design

For the month of October, students in Game Design have been learning about Computer Science and the principles of it. That way students have a real grasp of what is happening when we start creating games. Students had 6 CS lessons that they had to go through delivered in a hyperdoc (blended learning) assignment.

#### **Business Essentials**

As we are moving along learning the various parts of business, each student is adding to the business idea that they created at the beginning of the year. The goal is to have conceptually a solid business idea at the end of the semester. There will be a business showcase on a date TBD in December.

#### **FBLA**

On Thursday, October 24th FBLA hosted the annual Dodgeball Tournament. The tournament is open to any high school student, but this year a majority of the team member had to be FBLA members. The money raised from team admission fees will be donated to the March of Dimes. Teams also had to turn in a canned good item per team member. Those donated items will be taken to the Osage County Help House to be added to their pantry.

# KSHSAA Buffer Week

The KSHSAA Senior High Fall Athletic Buffer Week is Monday, November 11<sup>th</sup> thru Sunday, November 17<sup>th</sup>. There shall be no athletic practice, offseason conditioning, informal basketball shooting, working out on wrestling mats, etc. in **school owned** facilities during the fall athletic buffer week. Athletic activities of this nature may not be held under

the supervision of a school staff member in non-school facilities. This means a **moratorium** on all school sponsored athletic activities during this week. Gymnasiums shall not be open to students during the fall athletic buffer week for purposes of shooting baskets, working out with weights, etc. **outside of school hours**. Noon hour and physical education classes are considered part of the school day. Buffer week does not eliminate football practices for those senior high schools who qualify for football playoffs until such time their footballs season is over.
