

Leads on Learning

Last month I shared how a student qualifies for Title I services, and progress reports went home. This month I wanted share more about the math curriculum that we use to provide support to students.

Our math curriculum aligns with 4th and 5th grade curriculum, and is called EnVision Diagnostic and Intervention System. EnVision focuses on deep conceptual math understanding aided by visual models and personalized learning. To start, a grade level diagnostic assessment is given to diagnose readiness by testing content that should have already been learned. Missing skills are specifically targeted and individualized lessons are taught. Quick checks are given bi-weekly to monitor understanding. After lessons have been completed for a grade level, a post-test is given and if passed a student moves on to the next grade level's diagnostic assessment. This process is repeated until a student is back to their current grade level's math skills.

This is our second year using this intervention system and I believe our students are seeing wonderful growth! If you have any additional questions, please reach out!

Rhythm and Solfege

WITH RECORDERS

Students have started White Belt Recorder Karate with rhythm and solfege activities. This is the type of playing test that we will use for leveling up assessments through playing on their recorder with half note, quarter note, eighth notes, whole notes and quarter rests. So far we have fingered on G,A, B, and C. We will be transitioning through White Belt Rhythm and Solfege into Orange Belt Rhythm and Orange Belt Solfege this month. Yellow, Green, Red, Blue and Black Belt levels of increasingly challenging rhythms and solfege patterns (do- re-mi currently) await us this school year. When students play their rhythm lines and sing their solfege lines this month, they will receive the white belt for their recorder. Students are doing well playing by rows for practice. I am for all students learning and succeeding in music class. Parents are welcome to share their musical interests as well, especially with their student's class.

Early Winter Sports

Girls Basketball is underway and the Chargers are looking to continue their success from last season, which saw the 2022 8th Grade team finish the season as League Champs. This years' 8th Grade team is off to a 2-1 start, with the only loss being to non-league foe Baldwin. On October 26, the 8th grade team defeated Anderson County at home by a score of 26-15. Three days later, they topped Iola 49-3 to earn a 2-0 League record. The 7th Grade girls team currently holds a 1-2 record, also with a loss to Baldwin, and are 1-1 in League play. They defeated Anderson County 19-2 before falling to Iola in a game that came down to the wire, 17-19. Both teams welcome the Burlington Wildcats on November 2 at Carbondale Attendance Center. On November 11, the Lady Chargers will compete in the 2023 Girls Basketball Classic with 7th Grade traveling to play at Wabaunsee, and 8th grade hosting at Santa Fe Trail High School. Other schools participating in the tournament will be Washburn Rural B, Rossville, and Wabaunsee.

Junior High Wrestling began their season on October 19. The Chargers are coached this season by 2nd year Head Coach Robby Madden, 3rd year Assistant Coach Christian Gulker, and 1st year Assistant Coach Sierra Dempsey. The team faced a guick turnaround from practice to their first competition as they hosted The Charger Invitational at Santa Fe Trail High School on October 28. The team fared well at the Tournament as several Chargers brought home hardware, despite the stiff competition which featured Baldwin, Basehor-Linwood, Eudora, Paola, Tonganoxie and others. The team competed 2 days later at the BMS Cat Classic in Burlington. The Boys team finished the tournament tied for 3rd, while the Girls team finished in 1st Place bringing home a hardwood plaque. 8 Chargers finished atop of their Round Robin bracket at the meet.

The 4th graders are learning more detailed skills in google docs in creating a Fall or Halloween Acrostic Poem. The students follow a video of Mrs. Dayhoff explaining and showing in the video all the steps they need to do to insert word art, formatting the word art along with using wrap text so they can move the word art. They will then type words or phrases that begin with each of the letters of their acrostic poem. They will then insert a picture and edit their poem with different font size, font style and font color.

The 5th graders are using an animation website called www.animaker.com They explored how to use the website and they are creating a stop motion animation with a theme of Fall or Halloween.

6th Grade Tech

6th grade is learning about what it means to be a digital citizen and all the do's and don'ts that comes with living in the digital world. Students continue to practice their typing skills twice a week along with activities about the 6 topics of digital citizenship. The 6 topics are:

Digital Footprint/Identity, Relationships/Communication, Privacy/Security, Cyberbullying/Digital Drama/Hate Speech, Media Balance/ Well-Being and News/Media Literacy

7th/8th Grade

The students in this semester long tech class finished their unit in google docs and are now learning about google sheets (spreadsheets). They have their lessons delivered through a step by step video of Mrs. Dayhoff explaining each step while showing the screen in the video. The students started off by learning the basics of a spreadsheet and now moving into some basic calculations. They learned through the **Power** of a Penny lesson that they would rather let 1 penny double each day for 31 days then to take \$1 million dollars.

Students continue to practice their typing skills twice a week with formal typing lessons using www.typing.com and they are always encouraged to carry over their typing skills onto each computer lesson.

The students also have time through the week to work on their independent projects and some have enjoyed using the cricut which is a vinyl and paper cutting machine.

of November.




